ACE IT/Dual Credit Program

An ACE IT program is a program where students are working towards their certification in a trade governed by the ITA as they complete Level 1 Technical Training.

The ACE IT program enables students to earn both high school graduation credits as well as credit for the first level of technical training, usually at Post Secondary while still in high school

Some students can enroll in a "Foundation" program, what used to be called "Pre-Apprenticeship" program in order to get hired as an apprentice. Programs vary in length from 24-40 weeks.

These programs take students with little or no experience and provide them with the skills necessary to get hired in their particular trade. In addition, students receive Level 1 technical training as well as some work based training hours towards their apprenticeship. In a Dual credit program, students are enrolled in a Post-Secondary institution where they receive both credits from that institution as well as high school credits. The only difference between ACEIT and Dual Credit is that Dual Credit programs are not trade programs where the student achieves Level 1 technical training. See Mr. Kitt for more details.

Notes from the District Social Emotional Committee

Does any of this sound like your child or teen?

- not wanting to participate in unfamiliar activities
- wanting to stay home sick on the day of a school presentation
- crying every day before going to school, because a parent does not stay
- refusal to go on school field trips
- crying when the child sees a bee or a large dog that comes close
- having an upset stomach every time there is an important test at school
- lashing out or screaming
- being very slow in play or failure to join in with other children

If so, your child may be experiencing anxiety. Anxiety is a normal emotion that is essential for survival. Specialists in child development have also noticed that certain fears are more common at certain ages. For example, it is normal for young children to experience some anxiety around strangers, and for older children and teens to experience some performance anxiety in front of peers.

Anxiety is the most common mental health concern for children and adults. **The good news: anxiety can be successfully managed!** Parents play an essential role in helping their child or teen manage anxiety.

Why is it important to talk about anxiety? Children and teens often don't recognize their anxiety for what it is. Instead, they may think there is something "wrong" with them. Children may focus on the physical symptoms of anxiety (e.g. stomachaches). Teens may think they are weird, weak, out of control, or even going crazy! These thoughts might make them feel even *more* anxious and self-conscious. Therefore, the first step is to teach your child about anxiety and how to recognize it. Self-awareness is essential!

Anxiety is normal. Everyone experiences anxiety at some point in time. For example, it is normal to feel anxious when on a rollercoaster or before an exam. Anxiety is not dangerous. Although anxiety feels uncomfortable, it is temporary, and will eventually decrease. Anxiety is adaptive. Anxiety helps us prepare for real danger, such as crossing a busy street. It can also help us perform at our best, and motivate us to study for an exam or practice for a big game. When we experience anxiety, it triggers our "fight-flight-freeze" response, and prepares our body to react. For instance, our heart beats faster, to pump blood to our muscles, so we have the energy to run away or fight off danger. Without it, we would not survive. Still, difficulty with anxiety can cause considerable distress or interference in everyday life.

- Unity








